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Margaret and George have been friends since they both started school and enjoy playing together very much.

Margaret is an Irish Traveller and George is English; but to them they are no different. They just like to play together.



George's dad is at the school gate to pick him up. He sees George and Margaret together, but he does not seem very happy.



"You are not to play with Margaret any more George. She is a Traveller and we do not mix with that sort.

"They are nothing but trouble. Keep away from them!

"Do you understand?" shouts Georges' dad.

"Yes dad" - says George.



Margaret is waiting for George in the playground, as she does every day. She is looking forward to playing catch with him.



George looks angry when he is speaking to Margaret.

"I am not allowed to play with you anymore Margaret." George yells.

"You are a Traveller and that means you are nothing but trouble".



Margaret is really sad and just wants to go home. She does not understand what she has done wrong.



George is at home. He stares out of the window.

"I wish I could play with Margaret." he thinks to himself.

"I do not understand why my dad says she is trouble. She is never in trouble at school".



George's dad has taken him to a town hall meeting, where the local people are complaining about Gypsies and Travellers.

"Look, this Traveller problem has gone too far." George's dad says to the crowd.

"We need to get rid of them. We cannot have them ruining our town. They are nothing but trouble!"



A few days later people are protesting against the local Gypsies and Travellers, led by George's dad.

They want to show them that they are not welcome anymore.



Margaret and her mum see the protest as it goes past their home.

"Look mummy, there's George." Says Margaret very sadly. "He is holding a mean sign. Why does he hate me so much now?"

"It's ok Margaret, love", her mum replies. "It's not that he hates you. People like George's dad do not understand our ways and our culture".



The next morning, Margaret is ready to leave for school but really does not want to go.

"Please mammy", says Margaret. "I do not want to go to school. They do not like us there because we are Travellers.

No one will play with me anymore. Please don't make me go".
