



### **Overview**

The Traveller Movement 2024 conference, 'An Era of Change' will celebrate the beginning of a new chapter and will explore innovative policies that can bring about substantial improvements in the lives of these communities. While the challenges we face loom ever large now is the moment to chart a new path and call upon decision makers to break down barriers for Romani (Gypsy), Roma and Irish Traveller communities to bring about a new dawn.

Romani (Gypsy), Roma and Irish Traveller communities face multiple interconnecting disadvantages which have worsened since the Covid-19 pandemic and the ensuing cost-of-living crisis. Poor access to services, lack of access to adequate education, over-policing, overrepresentation in the criminal justice system, and an unfolding mental health crisis are among the barriers these communities face. Coupled with the persistent discrimination faced by the communities across every facet of their lives there is no doubt that Romani (Gypsy), Roma and Irish Traveller communities face systemic challenges in the UK.

The communities also face chronic democratic underrepresentation, with their inequalities often ignored by policymakers and labelled as unimportant. Often left out of conversations about systemic racial discrimination and pushed to the side in broader equality and improvement initiatives, their unique challenges and needs remain unmet.

But with a new Labour Government comes a new opportunity for policymakers and community members to the table to collaborate on revolutionary policies which will break down barriers which have long held communities back. Only with innovative policy solutions can the multiple, interconnecting crises facing Romani (Gypsy), Roma and Irish Traveller communities be tackled.

To address these challenges and bring about bold new ideas, the 2024 Traveller Movement Conference will bring together Romani (Gypsy), Roma and Irish Traveller community members, campaigners, policymakers, and other stakeholders to lead the way towards the new dawn of policymaking for Romani (Gypsy), Roma and Irish Traveller communities.

Through panels and workshops we will bring together changemakers and passionate advocates to bring about 'An Era of Change'.

The Traveller Movements Operation Traveller Vote campaign highlighted how powerful the communities' voices can be when they are combined for one goal; change. This year our conference will aim to channel those voices to tackle years of structural and institutional failings by revolutionising the policy landscape with new and creative ideas.



In answering this question, this workshop will explore the value of role models, the importance of building one another up and the actions the government must take to support a community-led definition of empowerment and gender equality.
